

The North West Rail Link and you



Hello, my name is Faye Rescigno.

I am a member of the North West Rail Link project team and my job is to keep the local community updated on this priority transport infrastructure project.

Following widespread feedback from the community as well as local business and industry groups, some important changes have been made to the North West Rail Link project.

This means more people will have better access to reliable public transport – including eight proposed railway stations and 4,000 commuter car parking spaces, 1,000

more than originally planned.

As the planning process begins, the North West Rail Link project team and I will keep you updated on what is happening near you.

Proposed new railway station at Cudgegong Road, and Tallawong stabling facility

Following extensive community feedback, the North West Rail Link project has been expanded to include eight proposed railway stations.

To ensure more people have better access to public transport, we are planning for two extra stations at Cudgegong Road and Bella Vista.

An integral part of the project is the Tallawong stabling facility.

This is where trains will finish their journeys at the end of the day and during off peak periods.

It is important to have somewhere close by to keep the trains when not in use.


The internal cleaning of trains and minor maintenance will also take place here.

The operation of Tallawong will comply with strict rules in relation to noise and lighting.

The Tallawong facility will be built in an area that has recently been

re-zoned for railway purposes and light industrial uses.

The community will have the chance to comment on the proposed facility when the environmental impact statement is exhibited in 2012.



What happens next

- The planning process has begun.
- You can make a comment on the North West Rail Link at any time.
- We will let you know when the environmental assessments that affect you are about to go on public exhibition – and how you can contribute.
- The two major environmental impact statements for the North West Rail Link will be lodged in 2012.
- The community will again have the chance to comment on the project during this exhibition period.
- The first environmental impact statement will focus on major construction activities including tunnelling and underground station construction. It will go on public display in the first half of 2012.

- The second will involve remaining construction work and operational rail infrastructure like tracks, trains and the stabling facility as well as station design and precinct planning. It is due to go on public display in the second half of 2012.
- The community will be kept fully informed when these assessments are lodged and about the timeframe for further feedback.
